Whisky or Whiskey What's the difference?

The main difference between scotch and whisky is where you are (your location), the ingredients (or recipe) and spellings. Scotch is whisky made in Scotland, while bourbon is whiskey made in the U.S.A, generally Kentucky. Bourbon is distilled from corn (having at least 51% corn) while Scotch is made mostly from malted barley. Also interesting to note that in Ireland it is spelled Whiskey and it is believed that spelling was brought to the USA by Irish Immigrants.

CAIRNGORM REINDEER

In preparation of the March 26, 2019 presentation I researched the Cairngorm Reindeer Herd in Scotland. Our guest speaker canceled and we didn't get to learn about these amazing animals, so I thought I could share the little I have learned. I contacted Cairngorm Reindeer Center and got permissions to use website information.*

Cairngorm Mountains in Scotland has a natural habitat made for these reindeer. The mountain range is situated in Cairngorm National Park, which stretches some 1,748 square miles. It is the largest national park in Great Britain. It is located about 140 miles north of Glasgow and about 30 miles south of Inverness—in the Scottish Highlands. This is the only area in Scotland where snow stays almost year round. ⁽¹⁾

It's noteworthy that both male and female Cairngorm Reindeer have antlers and they are renewed each year. They usually drop their antlers in late fall while the females may keep them until spring. As the seasons change new antlers grow and the bony parts of the new antlers are covered with thick velvet skin. ⁽²⁾

The Reindeer in Scotland were reintroduced in 1952 and have 10,000 acres for free roaming. The herd is now healthy and totals about 150 reindeer. They were brought into Scotland from Sweden. ⁽²⁾

Their coats consist of two layers; the outer layer is very dense to prevent the cold from penetrating and the inner layer is like downy (thick and warm) keeps them from losing heat. Their feet are flexible, split-hooves that lay flat to allow them to stay on top of snow—they are like snowshoes to keep them from sinking. ⁽²⁾

BEGINNERS LEVEL

Using Academic Journals and Theses for Genealogical Research

Academic journals and advanced degree theses often contain information useful for search. Academic libraries are the primary source for these types of research tools. While academic researchers are seldom identified as a group that commonly engage in genealogical studies for their own interests, they frequently utilize similar methods and address topics of interest to anyone doing genealogy. One of the primary benefits common to both of these research tools is the quality of indexing required for all sources. Many of these sources can be borrowed through inter-library loan. Most genealogical materials borrowed in genealogical research come from academic libraries.

One of the major focal points covered in both sources involves the historical development of communities. Social historians are actively involved in projects that study patterns of relationships within a community and their presence in the larger historical context of a particular time and place. Results are compiled utilizing primary historical source materials and statistical data. This combination of data intersects with the concerns and interests of genealogists in helping to understand the historical context in which our ancestors lived. Genealogists can use this data to answer many of the “why” and “what” questions we have about the lives of our ancestors.

Research topics explored include relationships between kinship and economics, inheritance patterns, and geographic mobility. While the main focus is on history, the

scope of investigation usually involves subject areas like demographics, sociology, anthropology, women’s studies, as well as ethnic populations and cultural studies. When these projects are completed, the findings and conclusions are published in various academic journals and books. These published materials include the methodology used, source citations, footnotes, and other related information. For graduate students, many publish their research data and conclusions as part of their Master’s theses and Doctoral dissertations. When researching genealogical holdings in academic libraries, materials are cataloged under the subject heading of Social History and Statistics (the academic term for genealogy). This would apply to printed books, academic journals, and theses. Using the search term genealogy may lead to incomplete searches when using a library catalog based on the LC subject classification system which is used in academic libraries.

When researching in a locality or region, check to see the location of an academic library in the vicinity with social history and statistics collection related to genealogical or historical research. Most academic/university libraries have online catalogs that offer the following services:

1. Search for titles and subject holdings
2. Online study/finding guides and tutorial
3. Contact information for specific departments/ collection within the library

These services are available to the general public in most cases. Many university libraries offer a courtesy library card to researchers who are not students. Researchers are advised to search the online catalog prior to their visit to see what materials the library has, where the materials are located within the library, whether they are restricted to in-house use only, or may be available for circulation or inter-library loan. Viewing of Special Collection materials usually requires an advance appointment, and most material in Special Collections does not leave the room where it is located, although there may be exceptions to that general rule, in some cases. For example, you may be able to request copies of non-fragile Special Collections material, once you determine exactly what you need for your research.

Genealogical and historical societies are another source of assistance. These societies usually provide research assistance in using all types of libraries and archives

within their service area. They can be especially helpful in cases of assisting patrons in academic libraries.

INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED LEVEL

Military College Preparatory Schools

Periodically we receive queries from patrons seeking information and records from military college preparatory schools or academies. For those not familiar with these institutions, conducting a basic Internet search using the term "Military College Prep Schools" will bring up a host of websites and specific school links containing information on the history of the school, current status, alumni, etc. This is applicable even if the school has been closed, as is the case with the one I attended briefly in the 1960s, Miami Military Academy.

Military schools of this nature began to appear in the aftermath of the Civil War and were established throughout the country. Each academy had its own history in terms of development, but they were especially prominent from the early 1920s through the late 1960s. The fallout from Vietnam caused many to close permanently in the 1970s, but a significant number are still in operation. Until the 1970s, admission to most academies or schools was limited to boys between the ages of 11-17 or grades 6-12. The intent was to provide an environment where they would develop leadership skills, patriotism, independence, intellectualism, and the desire to pursue a military career. Academies developed their curriculum through the Junior Reserve Officers Training Corp. (JROTC) whose mission was to instill in students values of citizenship, service to the United States, personal responsibility and a sense of accomplishment. The goal was to help groom a higher intellectual level of potential servicemen and officers for the nation's military and/or to serve in civilian government.

Options for locating records and other information depend on the institution and its guidelines for access. If

the institution is still in operation, contact the Office of the Registrar. Due to privacy concerns, many private school records are not accessible to the public; however, if you can demonstrate that one or more of the following situations apply, you may be able to increase your chances of overcoming this privacy barrier:

- That the subject of your inquiry is deceased (provide death info with inquiry)
- That you have a family connection with your subject (describe connection)
- That your inquiry is a legitimate genealogical research project or activity (provide membership affiliation or certification with a genealogical/historical organization)

If the institution has closed, locating information can be challenging but not impossible. The following options have proven to be successful:

1. Virtually all academies/schools no longer operating, such as Miami Military Academy, have well-established alumni associations that have a proven track record for being very helpful.
2. Since most of these schools were under the jurisdiction of the United States military, the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) has some surviving records and information.
3. The State Department of Education set standards and licensed the schools to operate.
4. Most schools were accredited and affiliated with other educational organizations that may have potentially useful information or research advice. Examples would include the Florida Council of Independent Schools; Southern Association of Independent Schools; National Association of Independent Schools; and Association of Military Colleges and Schools.
5. Clues also may be found in old family records, letters, souvenirs, obituaries, tombstone inscriptions, and local histories.
