Edinburgh, the historic capital of Scotland, has been called the 'Athens of the North' because it too has a series of hills and a long dedication to learning and the arts. In earliest time, men built a defensive position on the high steep rock that dominates the skyline. With the southern expansion of the Kingdom of the Scots Edinburgh became the principal residence of the monarch and, eventually, the capital city. It was extended in the late 1700s with the addition of the Georgian 'New Town', now the central area of Edinburgh.

The Castle looms above a modern city remarkable for its richness of history and culture. Visitors can see St. Margaret's Chapel, the oldest building there and still hear the cannon signal the hour at 1 pm. Recent excavations nearby have shown evidence that the Romans once occupied the castle site. The Edinburgh Festival and the Tattoo are favorites of visitors from all over the world. There are numerous museums in the city and it is the home of one of the world's great universities.

Several attempts have been made to develop a special tartan for residents or visitors. None had success until the design of the Edinburgh tartan by Councillor Hugh Macpherson on behalf of Hugh Macpherson Ltd. In 1970 on the occasion of the Commonwealth Games. It is symbolic and represents the colors of Edinburgh as follows:
