Strathspey, the village of the River Spey, is one of the loveliest and the most fertile areas of the Highlands. Rising in a tiny loch, the Spey flows east through the grassland of Badenoch to Kingussie (*Cinn a'Ghuithsaich*--head of the fir forest). Here Strathspey proper begins at the Forest of Rothiemurchus, one of the last original forests of Britain. Strathspey is a major producer of malt whisky and the Spey, flowing directly to the sea with no major falls, is famous for its salmon fishing.

From Craigellachie, the cliff above Aviemore to Craigellachie, the village twenty-five miles down river, Strathspey was the home of Clan Grant. Grantown-on-Spey was planned in 1776 by Sir James Grant of Grant (whose family, after 1811, acquired the title of Earl of Seafield). Parts of Castle Grant date from the 1400s but most of the structure was built in the 19th century.

The Stathspey tartan is taken from the back of a waistcoat supposedly worn by an officer of the Stathspey Fencibles Regiment which was raised by General James Grant of Ballindalloch (1793-1799). The waistcoat was exhibited at the Highland Exhibition in Inverness in 1930, having been lent by Col. J. Grant Smith of Grantown-on-Spey. Instead of the number of black lines being two or four respectively on alternate blue squares, there are three on every such square.

In 1984, the Strathspey district tartan was recommended to the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society as being suitable for wear by dancers with no clear affiliation of their own
