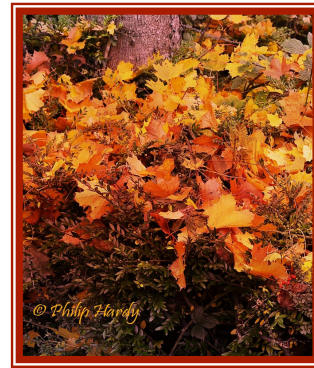

*Membership Meeting Minutes
September 28, 2021*

President Wilson called the meeting to order at 6:12 PM and asked Program Commissioner Robbin Goodin to introduce our presenters, Tom Hay Bauer and Beret Dernbach, who both live in California and

were presenting virtually. Robbin, who was also present virtually, gave a short biography and introduced Tom first. He is a member of the Hay Clan through his mother and has served Clan Hay for over 30 years.

As part of the San Diego Expos of 1915 and 1935, a set of international cottages were built in Balboa Park. There are about 30 cottages, each with information and exhibits relating to a different country. Tom told us that the cottages are a little like Disney's Epcot Center, but tours are free. Tours are available every weekend from noon to 4:00 PM. He told us the cottages serve as an introduction to the country's culture and as public relations for each member nation.

The House of Scotland has been there since 1935 and served official and diplomatic functions for the House of the British Empire at first. Britain has its own cottage now. There are many exhibits in what is now the Scottish cottage; bag pipes, kilts, books, models of ships and trains, the Braener Challenge Caber, Clan crest plaques, information boards, and more.

He told us about the many events hosted by the House of Scotland (HOS). These include Tartan Day, held in April on the first Saturday. This is a mini-Highland Game, cohosted by the HOS Pipe Band. There is a Lawn Program, also cohosted by the HOS Pipe Band, held on the last Saturday in October. To check for further information, go to the houseofscotland.org.

Robbin then introduced our second presenter, Beret Dernbach. She has been performing Scottish dancing for 13 ½ years since she was 5 years old. Beret has been a 2-time World champion, 2-time US champion, 2-time N. American champion, and 5-time Women's champion. Beret gave us some background on Scottish dancing, which is documented as far back as the 1200s. It was originally used to select warriors to fight in battle, and women were not allowed to compete in these dances. National dances for women were held

when they could not participate in the dances for men. Women's dances were more flowing and graceful.

Highland dancing today requires a great deal of stamina, strength, athleticism, grace, and artistry. Dances include the Highland Fling, Sword Dance (Gillie Callum), Sean Truibhas (pronounced Shawn Trews), and Reels (Highland Reels and Hullachan).

There are a wide variety of dances performed by a single dancer, including Character dances, the Scottish version of the Irish jig, and the Hornpipe. These were called Character dances because the dancer played a character, such as an angry washerwoman or a sailor onboard a ship.

Choreography dancing is non-traditional, involving new combinations of Highland movements, often in groups. These are the only competitions by groups of dancers. These are performed in non-traditional Scottish music.

Beret then talked about the various outfits worn during different dances. The Royal Scottish Official Board of Highland Dance decides what may be worn for each dance.

The World competitions are held each year at the Cowal Highland Gathering. Three World champions are crowned, in Juvenile, Junior, and Adult age groups. This competition is held outside, no matter the weather. The top three winners perform a Highland Fling together at the end of the day.

There were some questions. Steve Goodin asked about how she wore her hair during the competition. Beret said it just needs to be something that is not distracting.

Robbin Goodin asked about her practice routine. She said she practices at least one hour each day, and two hours for a few days before a competition. She trains year-round and is constantly looking for and taking care of over-use injuries.

There was a question about competition season, which she said is from May to August. She chooses which ones she wants to compete in, as there are competitions nearly every weekend.

Mr. Wilson announced break time, and we had a few minutes of socializing while we snacked. It was lovely to see each other again.

BUSINESS MEETING

The business meeting started at 7:20 PM. Mr. Wilson asked if there were any visitors. Kate Bruenn, Linda Wilson's sister, was present.

Mr. Wilson then asked Gary Schweitzer to talk about the basket sword he brought to the meeting. Gary told us that a couple who live in Bardstown donated the sword to the SSL to be used in whatever way we choose. He said it is being raffled off, \$1 a ticket or \$5 for 6 tickets. It is a beautiful sword with a baldric. The money will go to the Heritage Fund.

Mr. Wilson gave Membership Commissioner Marla Jo Cameron's report, as she could not attend. There are 30 individual members, 72 family members, 32 life members, 7 honorary members, giving a total of 141.

Mr. Wilson then reported on the auction in November. Mr. Wilson spoke to Cheryl at Strathmoor church. She says we can get in at 4:30 PM to set up. There are 10 6-foot tables and 10 8-foot tables with chairs. Member At Large Pat Schweitzer reminded us that we need as many people helping as possible to set up.

Mr. Wilson reminded us that the tickets for Burns' Night have gone up from \$45 to \$50 for this year, due to increases in the cost of food and other necessities.

Vice President Dianne Holland told us that the church is not collecting peanut butter this year, so members do not need to bring peanut butter to the

auction.

Dianne reminded us that she lives quite close to Strathmoor, and anyone who wishes to donate to the auction but cannot come may leave donations with her, and she will get them to the church.

Mr. Wilson asked Jack Bowling, who has acted as our auctioneer for several years, to comment on the auction. Jack reminded us that our donated items need to be something we would like to take home, in good condition, and clean. Past items have included small appliances, decorative home items, exercise equipment, paintings, Scottish themed items, Christmas items, jewelry, and other items.

We are calling the auction A Scottish Family Reunion this year. There was a question about using the kitchen at the church. They need to warm up their dish when they get there. President Wilson told us we can use the kitchen for warming up food that is already prepared, and for clean-up afterwards.

Secretary Linda Wilson told us there were 29 members present, including our presenters.

Mr. Wilson asked for a motion to approve the August minutes. A motion was made by Dianne Holland, the motion was seconded and was passed by the members present.

Electronics Commissioner Damien Burns had no report.

Treasurer Cheri Eskridge, Membership Commissioner Marla Jo Cameron, Hospitality Commissioner Anne Lewis, and Newsletter Editor Commissioner John Moffett were not present.

Mr. Wilson asked Jack Bowling about Connie Fry, a member who was injured recently. Jack said she fell on the tile in her bathroom and broke her femur just above her knee replacement. Her doctor told them she may have had a cardiac incident and passed out. She is now in rehabilitation and much

happier than when she was in the hospital.

Mr. Wilson adjourned the meeting at 8:50 PM.

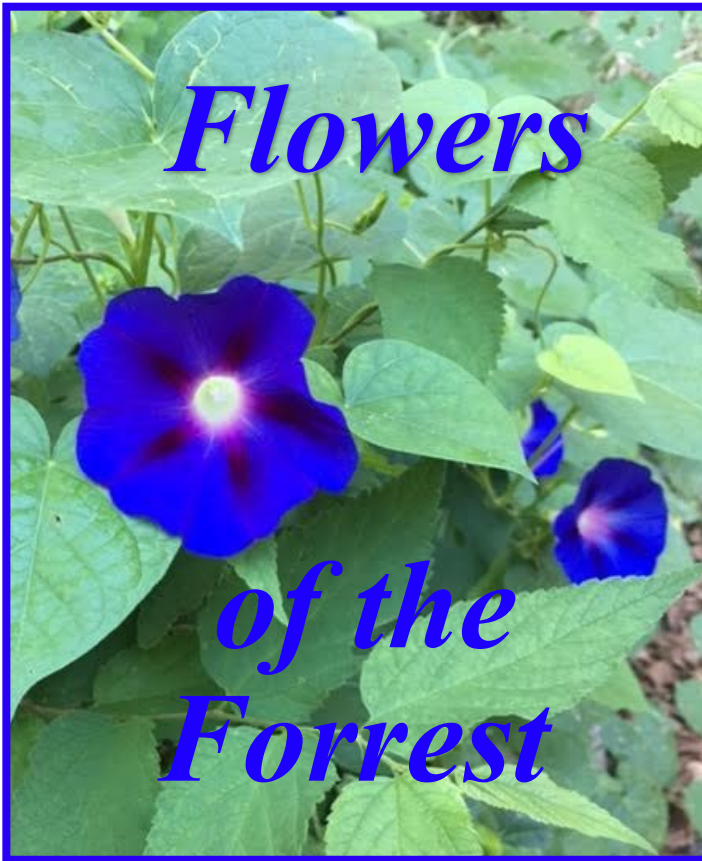
